#### SOMEONE YOU SHOULD KNOW - RABBI BURTON AND MAXIMA WAX



Rabbi Burton Wax was born in Chicago in 1936 and grew up in Albany Park. A product of the Chicago Public Schools (Volta and Von Steuben), he attended Hebrew School at Congregation Beth Itzchok. In 1950 he began commuting to the HTC on Douglas Blvd. He completed his rabbinic studies in 1959 and was formally ordained in 1960. He was awarded a BA from Roosevelt University in 1955 and an MA in Education Administration from Northwestern University in 1958.

In addition to being in the Jewish book business from 1956 until 2001, Rabbi Wax taught Bar Mitzvah preparation and Hebrew School.

In 1991 he was engaged as Rabbinic Associate at Cong. Ezras Israel, and subsequently promoted to Assistant Rabbi. Upon the retirement of Rabbi Kaganoff z"l in 2003, Rabbi Wax was elected to fill the pulpit. He retired in 2008 but was recalled in 2012 (He is the Grover Cleveland Rabbi of Ezras Israel.)

Maxima was born in St. Paul Minnesota. Her father was a Jewish educator which caused them to move around a lot. When she was 11 her family finally settled in Chicago. Funny enough Maxima's parents lived in Park Plaza for over 10 years and her father lived to be 103!

She attended Roosevelt High School and then Maxima went on to study at Wright College. She also studied at Spertus Institute. She worked for her father and his book store, Schwartz-Goodman (which later became Rosenbloom's) on Devon. She also worked for Magen Dovid Adom for 25 years as an administrative assistant.

Burton and Maxima met at Bnei Akiva when they were teenagers and were married in January 1957. They are the proud parents of Ora (Maury) Aaron and Ari (Pola) Wax, and grandparents and great grand-parents of many.

Maxima and Burt moved to Park Plaza full-time a few months ago but would come for the Jewish Holidays and an occasional meal. They complement the staff on their kind and accommodating nature. Burton enjoys the daily minyan and no longer has to worry about the weather. Maxima enjoys the exercise class, especially the one given by RPI.

The future of the Wax's grandchildren and great-grandchildren matters the most to them. They would like to see more Achdut among fellow Jews. "We all have to come together," they both say.
