On November 15, over 200,000 Jews and non-Jews "prayed with their feet" on the mall in Washington DC to show support for Israel, stand up against antisemitism, and demand the return of all the hostages. People of all ages, of all backgrounds, and

from different states stood and listened to inspiring speeches, swayed with the music, and chanted Bring Them Home Now.

What do we do now that The March is over? How do we "pray with our feet" during these troubling times? First, please visit the Empty Shabbat Table located in the long hallway. Please take a moment to be present in the pain and sadness the hostages and their families are feeling. Second, use your voice: Spend one minute a day calling your US representatives and mentioning both your support for Israel as well as your desire to get the hostages back.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK



Chanukah is practically here. Such a joyous and festive time. From the shining lights to the family time, even the good food adds to the festive nature. The most famous question regarding Chanukah is why the eight nights? The Maccabees had enough oil to burn for one night so nothing miraculous took place the first night. If we light to commemorate the miracle, we should only light seven

nights not eight. There are literally hundreds of answers to this question. One answer proposed by the late chief rabbi, Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks Z'L has to do with Jewish faith.

Perhaps the miracle was this, that the Maccabees found one cruse of oil with its seal intact, undefiled. There was no reason to suppose that anything would have survived the systematic desecration the Greeks and their supporters did to the Temple. Yet the Maccabees searched and found that one jar. Why did they search? Because they had faith that from the worst tragedy something would survive. The miracle of the first night was that of faith itself, the faith that something would remain with which to begin again.

This is the miracle of Jews and Jewish history that faith endures. Even in the face of terrible tragedies there is a glimmer of hope and a spark of faith. The Maccabees had faith the Hashem was on their side and would bless their endeavor and so they searched for pure untainted oil. As we see the Chanukah lights burning let's remind ourselves of our enduring faith. This year when Israel is at war and Jews from all over the world are on the front lines lets renew our faith in the miraculous and pray for God's protection for Israel.














A THANK YOU FROM SHELLY KLEINMAN
