From the Rabbi's Desk



This August, for me, feels conflicted. While it is the heart of the summer season, it overlaps with the sad Jewish month of Av. Right at the beginning of August, we will observe the solemn fast of Tisha B'Av. We will mourn the loss of our two holy temples and recount the generations of exile and suffering that we have endured as a people. Some of us will

fast for 24 hours as we do on Yom Kippur, and we will sit low and recite the stirring words of lamentations. As sad as the day is, there is still a whole month of Av, and August afterward.

In fact, the Talmud tells us that the fifteenth day of the month of Av, less than a week after Tisha B'Av, is one of the happiest days in the Jewish calendar and is observed by refraining from the prayer of Tachnun during services. So, how do we balance the sadness with joy, the mourning with festive summer? How do we hold both in our hands?

I think the answer is a very Jewish one, we have to hold onto both inside of us. Just like we recite yizkor in the midst of the festive holidays, we have to realize that the sadness and celebration are part of life. So indeed, we have to mourn on Tisha B'Av and we have to feel the sadness of the exile, but we also have to look forward to the rest of August. We must celebrate the summer and take in all that the season has to offer while not forgetting that the world is an imperfect place.

These two perspectives of fasting and feasting can revolve around our proud Jewish identity. As we reach the last month before the High Holidays, we have to embrace our communal Jewish identity. Whether it is in sadness or celebration, we must know who we are and embrace our special community. May we have a special month, and may we feel connected in community to each other every day.




